ANGRY MOTHERS WIN!!!

Last month the Socreds invented a sneaky way of taking \$50 a month away from single mothers.

But mothers on welfare got angry. They wrote letters to the editor. They started a petition and went on radio talk shows. They also met with NDP MLA John Cashe e at the Unitarian church.

They held a rally on April 25th at Robson Square. Two hundred people came. Many women spoke out

One minute before the rally began, the Soc-reds announced that some parents would be

able to keep the \$50. These mothers have one baby under six months old. Mothers with two children under six years will also be able to keep the \$50.

So our work did have an effect.

But parents with school children will still face a \$50 cut-back in October. So we still have to fight so those people can keep their \$50.

UPDATE: BUS FARES

Bus fares will go up on June 1st. The new basic fare will be \$1.25.

The Regional Transit Commission decided to raise the fare at their meeting on April 28th.

Many people spoke out against the fare increase at a public meeting early in April.

As a result, the Commission delayed the fare increase for one month.

The Commission plans to raise fares every year to help pay off the cost of Sky Train.

This will continue unless we can make the provincial government pay a larger share of transit costs. Vancouver City Council voted to agree with the fare increase.

HOUSING FOR US

Low income people should get half of the new housing that will be built on the Expolands.

That's what ELP and the Tenants Rights Action Coalition told Bill Vander Zalm.

But so far there is no guarantee that any housing for low income people will be built on those lands.

Meanwhile, 17,268 families and single people are on waiting lists for social housing.

LOW MINIMUM WAGE CAUSES POVERTY

The minimum wage will go up to \$4.50 an hour on July 1st. But a person working at minimum wage will still be way below the poverty line.

The low minimum wage is a big reason that so many people are poor.

A single person who works full time, even at the new minimum wage, will only earn 76% of the poverty line.

A single parent with one child who works at the new minimum wage would only earn 56% of the poverty line.

Years ago, in 1975, the minimum wage was above the poverty line for single people. It was 22% above the poverty line.

If the minimum wage now was 22% above the poverty line, it would be \$7.24 an hour!!!!



COUNCIL SAYS "NO"

City Council will give \$100,000 to the Vancouver Rowing Club. But it won't feed hungry kids.

Council defeated a motion that would have provided \$200,000 for a good food program in four schools. There are thirteen schools that have a large number of children in need.

The Aldermen who voted against the grant were Jonathan Baker, Don Bellamy, Ralph Caravetta, and George Puil.

End Legislated Poverty and the Child Poverty Action Committee thought the motion would pass. Alderman Caravetta had said that he would vote for the motion. A similar motion was passed by the School

Board to supply \$200,000 for food in four schools.

"It was very hard to get funding from the School Board. We had to go back again and again," Said Patricia Chauncey of CPAC.

So far the Dignity Players have put on one play about food banks and another play about hungry children.




FOOD BANK WILL HELP YOU REGISTER TO VOTE
