#### DISABLED COALITION HAS NEW ADVOCATES



The B. C. Coalition of the Disabled has opened a new office to help disabled people who have problems with welfare, handicapped pension, long term care, housing, and other things.

Three people have been hired to do the work. They are Garry Colley, Robin Loxton, and Ninel Hoffmann.

Robin Loxton says that people who are not disabled will also be helped if the staff people have time. we don't have the answer, we'll try to refer you to someone who does, " says Robin Loxton. You don't have to be on HPIA in order to get help at this new office. In fact, it would be a good place to go if you are trying to get the handicapped pension but have been

turned down.

Funding for the project comes from the Law Foundation.

The office is open from 9 to 5 Monday through Friday. It is at 456 W. Broadway. For more information, phone 872-1278.

The Downtown Eastside Residents' Association (DERA) at 9E. Hastings, and the Tenants' Action Centre have also received grants from The Law Foundation to pay advocates. ## TRY FOR A BUS PASS IF YOU ARE DISABLED

Are you a disabled person who is not getting GAIN for the Handicapped? If so it still might be possible for you to get a bus pass that costs only \$36 a year. There is a new GAIN policy on this.

the B. C. Coalition of the Disabled have advocates that will try to get the bus pass for you if you are on GAIN as "unemployable," or on some other kind of income (CPP, UI, WCB,

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### BIG BUSINESS GROUPS WANT

What can we expect now that the free trade deal is passed?
Over the Christmas holidays, powerful groups representing big corporations gave us a hint.

The Canadian
Manufacturer's
Association wants a
Royal Commission into
social spending. Social
spending is money spent
on things like old age
pension, childcare, and
welfare.

In 1984 the Manufacturer's Association wrote a report. They said that most of the programs we have now should be abolished. Some of these include welfare, old age pensions, UI,

veterans allowance, social assistance to Indians. Then they want to use the money spent on these programs to pay for another program. They call the new program a Guaranteed Annual Income. But anti-poverty groups call it Guaranteed Poverty.

FREE TRAPE

The corporations have stolen the Guaranteed Annual Income and are changing it to help themselves, not low income people. They want it to be used as a wage top up so that

minimum wages won't have to go up. In other words, the government would help corporations pay wages. That way the corporations would have more profits and pay lower taxes.

Over the holidays, another Big Business group called for cuts to unemployment insurance. In the U. S. UI is much worse than in Canada.

For example, farm workers and fishermen can't get UI in the US.

Here they can. UI is paid for by workers and business. But business doesn't want to pay its share.

Canadian Big Business thinks these changes would help them "compete" with U. S. business that pays lower taxes for worse social programs.

End Legislated Poverty has been fighting against free trade because we thought social programs were at risk. Business didn't

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
### DUNION DOES GOOD DEED

The BC Government saved a few women and children from getting beat up over the Christmas holidays. Here's how: SS&H sent out a letter to women on children were at risk. GAIN who have maintenance orders from their ex-partners. The letter gave women only a few days to tell the Ministry where they wanted to have their maintenance cheques sent. The letter said that if SS&H did not receive this information, they would Automatically give the woman's address to the ex-partner.

A BCGEU member alerted ELP and the union to this problem. ELP immediately contacted Leslie Arnold who had

signed the letter. The Employees Union may have BCGEU immediately sent a letter by FAX to Ms. The GEU said it Arnold. was extremely concerned at the short time period and that women and ELP demanded that no addresses be given to ex-partners unless the women authorized it. Ms. Arnold immediately apologized and took steps to extend the date to the end of January.
