






• DO YOU WANT TO LIVE IN A CO-OP?

- Are you on welfare? Do you have a chance to live in a co-op? Sometimes co-ops want new residents to pay \$1000 or more for a share purchase.
- You may be able to get the money for a share purchase from welfare. It would be treated like

a security deposit that you pay when you move into a rented place. You get it back when you move out.

If you need money for a share purchase, ask your worker. If the worker says no, contact one of the groups on the back page.

JUST FOR COMPARISON...

David Culver, the chairman of Alcan Aluminum Ltd. got \$1,504,247 in cash and benefits in 1988. His increase was 93.8 percent.

Donald Phillips, President of Inco Ltd., got \$1,994,058 in cash and benefits last year. His increase over 1987 was 141.4 percent.

WHAT ABOUT CORPORATIONS?

The top 1000 Canadians companies had profits that increased by an average of 35% last year. The year before, they increased by 52%. Bank profits rose by \$4 BILLION last year.

The Royal Bank made \$712,318,000 in profits last year. The Bank of Montreal made \$553,352,000. The Bank of Nova Scotia made \$506,647,000. The Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce made \$591,030,000. Inco made \$690,804,000. Alcan made \$931,000,000.

Why is this important? We could elect politicians who would create a wealth tax. With a wealth tax, rich people would pay higher taxes that would pay for things like public housing, childcare, and cleaning up the enrironment.

Corporations should also pay more taxes. Already Corporations owe the government over \$30 Billion in deferred taxes that they will probably never pay. We could elect politicians who would make these profitable companies pay their share in taxes.



CEEDS GOES TO THE CITY

CEEDS is a group of organic farmers who have 3 farms in the Caribou region. They have been farming and developing their self-sufficient community for 14 years. They do mixed farming: raising livestock and poultry, and gardening.
