B.C.TOWNS WANT HIGHER WELFARE, HIGHER WAGES, AND AN END TO FORCED EMPLOYMENT

End Legislated Poverty has asked all the towns and cities in B. C. to pass resolutions calling for:

*welfare rates to be raised to the poverty line;

*minimum wage to be raised to \$7.50 an hour;

*single parents on welfare to have choice about whether or not to look for work.

Towns and cities don't control these things. But ELP has asked them to tell Bill Vander Zalm to increase welfare and wages and stop forced employment of single parents.

So far these towns have passed one or more of the ELP

resolutions or similar resolutions: Alert Bay, North Vancouver, Fernie, Elkford, Township of Langley, Trail, Alberni Regional District, New Westminster, Powell River, Cowichan Regional District, Sidney, Central Coast Regional District, and the District of Kitimat.

Vancouver City Council has passed a resolution on forced employment. It will consider the resolutions on welfare and wages soon.

EVERYDAY WE SUFFER

I haven't had a decent Christmas in 40 years. I had a turkey dinner once at a hospital. I got shock treatment the next day. They called it "therapy."

I got nothin' now--I don't even have a warm room and clean sheets. I've got a room in the Downtown Eastside. It's the best I could find for \$300. I'm only getting \$394 per month.

I've worked for the Hudson's Bay truck driving and slumpin (delivering packages). I helped build the Wiliams Lake airport. I've done warehouse work. I had a leg operation 20 years ago. It never healed. I'm on GAIN for Handicapped now, but I'm not getting my full cheque. I'm talking to DERA about that.

I just want to let people and the government know that not everybody is having a good life--not just at Christmas, but all year long, we suffer.

MAKE SURE YOU GET YOUR TAX CREDITS

This year low income people should be able to get a Federal Sales Tax Credit of \$140 per adult. In addition, we should be able to get a GST Tax Credit in July and October, 1991 and January and April, 1992. The basic GST tax credit is a total of \$190 per year.

To get this money, you have to get your income tax form filled out. The Downtown Eastside Residents' Association will help you do this for free. They are at 9 E. Hastings St. They will start filling out the forms when they are available. Call first to see if the forms are in. The number is 682-0931.

Be sure to bring your T5007 tax slip if you got welfare or senior supplements worth over \$500 in 1990. The provincial government should mail this to

you before Feb. 28th. This is a new form and a new hassle for people. If you don't get your T5007 tax slip by Feb. 28th, call 660-1313 in Vancouver or 1-800-665-2928 outside of Vancouver.

INCENTIVE PROGRAM

Are you a handicapped person on the incentive program with SS&H? This is where you work for a non profit group as a volunteer and SS&H gives you \$50 for your work-related expenses. SS&H often says that you can only work on the incentive program for six months or 1 year.

However, if you are handicapped, and if your year is up, you may be able to extend the work for another year. Ask your worker to extend your work under section 14. If you need help, go to an advocate group on the back page.

SANCTUARY!

Some single mothers are working with End Legislated Poverty to have a Sanctuary on Feb. 15 and 16 to draw attention to the situation of single parents on welfare who

are forced to look for work or training.

The Sanctuary will be at the Four Sisters Co-op Daycare. Childcare, food, entertainment will be provided. If you would like to get involved, call Pam or Jean at ELP (879-1209). The women plan to stay overnight at the Four Sisters with their kids, to invite the media to talk to them about their situation, and to invite supporters, and politicians to drop by.

The women had asked for a meeting with Social Services and Housing Minister Norm Jacobsen. Jacobsen said he wouldn't meet with the group because there is a case before the courts. But the women don't want to discuss the court case. They want Jacobsen to change the GAIN regulations

so they can look after their children if they choose to.

When Jacobsen refused to

meet with ELP and single parents, we decided to have the sanctuary to draw attention to the cruelty and

the sanctuary to draw attention to the cruelty and discrimination of forced employment legislation.

So far ELP and the women involved have done these things to try to get the government to stop forced employment of single parents on welfare:

*Decided to get together with ELP to work on this issue

*Asked towns to pass resolutions against forced employment;

*Helped get a court case started to challenge the forced employment law in court. Theresa Tressidder and Ellen Hiltz are the people involved in the case;

*Asked for a meeting with Norm Jacobsen, the Minister in charge of this issue.

ELP GOES TO OTTAWA

Three people from ELP will go to Ottawa in February. They will talk to a Parliamentary Committee on Child Poverty. The ELP reps are Antionette Naffaa, Karen Shillington, and Linda Marcotte.

They will tell the politicians to stop increasing child poverty with UI cutbacks, the GST, high unemployment, and cuts to social programs. They will say that we need to end parent poverty in order to end child poverty. We can do this if we have higher welfare, higher vages, fair taxes, and job creation.



FREE LEGAL ADVICE FOR WOMEN

employer/employee problems, custody and access, immigration, human rights, UIC and welfare, and WCB.


Legal advice will be available on Feb. 12, 26, and March 12. To make an appointment, call 228-5791.

GST ON HOTELS AND ROOMING HOUSES?

The GST Hotline says there is no GST on rooms that you live in if you pay less than \$20 a day. That would be about \$600 a month. If you live in a hotel or rooming house, you should not have to pay GST. The Downtown Eastside Residents' Association has all the information on this. If you live in a hotel or rooming house and the landlord charges you GST, call DERA at 682-0931.
