VANCOUVER CITY AND SCHOOL BOARD PASS ELP RESOLUTIONS

Support is growing for these three things:

*raising welfare rates to the poverty line;

*increasing minimum wage; *ending forced employment for single parents on welfare.

On Feb. 4th the Vancouver School Board passed three resolutions from End Legislated Poverty. The resolutions were about raising welfare and minimum wage and ending forced employment of single parents on welfare. All of the school trustees agreed with the resolutions.

Then, on Feb. 21st, people from lots of community groups asked Vancouver City Council to pass the resolutions on welfare rates and minimum wage. The city already passed a resolution asking the province to end forced employment for single

parents on welfare. The City agreed that welfare rates should be at the poverty line. They are going to collect more information on the minimum wage.

Paul Taylor of Carnegie spoke on behalf of ELP at the City meeting. Roneen Marcoux of The Tenants Rights Coalition, Sam Snobelen of DERA, Pat Chauncey of the Child Poverty Action Committee, Robin Loxton of the B. C. Coalition of People with Disabilities, Karen Tully of the Downtown Eastside Women's Centre, and John Fitzpatrick of the Vancouver and District Labour Council all supported the ELP resolutions.

Now we have to use this support to get the Government in Victoria to increase welfare and minimum wage and stop forcing single parents to work outside the home.

THE FEDERAL BUDGET--MAKING THE POOR POORER

Each year governments have budgets. The budgets are usually quite thick and hard to understand. The government person who is in charge of budgets is the Finance Minister. He gives a budget speech when he brings the budget to parliament.

Who will the government take money from? Who will the government give money to? That is what the budget is about.

On Feb. 26th Michael Wilson gave the budget speech for this year in Ottawa. He did a lot of talking abour competition. This is the new buzzword of politicians and corporations. They want people in Canada to compete with people in Mexico and other developing countries. They want competition based on lower wages, higher unemployment, and trashed social programs. The budget will make Canadians poorer in these ways:

*Unemployment will grow to over 10%. Unemployed people are generally poor people.

*The government will continue to lay off people who work for it.

*The government will have a wage freeze on public workers. Some public workers are already living in poverty because their wages are so low.

*The government is trying to end medicare by cutting the amount of money it gives to provinces for health.

*The government is also cutting money it provides for education. It will be even harder for poor people to go to University.

*The government cut funding for social housing by 15% when homelessness is growing in the country.

*The government put limits on the amount it will pay to provinces for welfare. Will this mean cuts to welfare?

Does this seem like a good government to vote for in the next election?

TAX HELP FOR SINGLE PARENTS




It is not too late to fight the Gouge and Screw Tax. This poverty causing tax must be
