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## ON THE MORNING OF TUESDAY JULY 11<sup>TH</sup> TWO THOUSAND CROSSES PLANTED IN OPPENHEIMER PARK EACH CROSS SYMBOLIZES A DEATH FROM ILLICIT DRUG OVERDOSE IN BC SINCE 1990

In July of 1997, a demonstration was held at the corner of Main and Hastings where traffic was blocked for 15 minutes. A thousand crosses were planted in Oppenheimer Park, each one symbolizing a lethal drug overdose death in BC from 1992 to 1997. The event was put on by the Committee for Compassion and Justice, a coalition brought together by Bud Osborn and spearheaded by the Portland Hotel Society.

In the three years since 1997, one thousand more people have died as the result of illicit drug overdose in British Columbia, most of them in the downtown eastside of Vancouver.

A number of groups, including the Vancouver Area Network of Drug Users -- VANDU and the Harm Reduction Action Society -- HRAS, are putting on a two thousand cross event on Tuesday, July 11th, 2000.

The plans for the day include;

9:30 AM -- blocking traffic at Main & Hastings & the burning of research and reports,

10:30 AM -- speakers, music & food at Oppenheimer Park

11:30 AM -- press conference at Oppenheimer Park.

July 11<sup>th</sup> is the birthday of Gil Puder, an internationally respected constable with the Vancouver Police Department, who died on November 12, 1999 of cancer. Gil is celebrated as a courageous and outspoken opponent of the War on Drugs and an advocate for returning honor to policing.

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
