Since starting the project on July 6th, 1998, the following has been accomplished:

- Extensive planning of the project from beginning to the end of March, 1999
- Direct contact through site visits to 9 community organizations
- Seminar at the BC Centre of Excellence on "Women-Centred Care"
- Focus group through about a community health clinic for gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgendered persons, coordinated through The Centre (formerly the Gay and Lesbian Centre)
- Two initial meetings with the Vancouver/Richmond Health Board Evaluation coordinator with respect to our intensive evaluation
- Research for the CHA Manual and development of an outline

- En The people in the service industry are so passionate about what they do they they welcome any new idea with open arms! I have been overwhelmed by the support for this project.
- 50 That the VWHC is on the right track! Oh yes....absolutely.

Also, I have learned that:

- En To keep a project going, you need passion and dedication of volunteers and staff. Well done all you wonderful women!
- **SO** We need to do a better job at documenting our history
- We need to do regular and consistent networking. I heard from several people "Oh! The Collective! I haven't heard from you women in a long time!"
- is I love what I do...it makes me tick. Thank you for giving me this opportunity!

And the big news is..... l have four women confirmed (almost) as CHAs!

- 1. Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgendered (LGBT)Community
- 2. South Asian Women
- 3. Two women from DAWN Canada (Disabled Women's Network)
