PWA Society's request for City of Vancouver funding was approved by City Council at their meeting October 4th. The original request of \$23,000 (for staff, rent, and telephone) was halved by the Finance and Priorities Committee to \$11,750. This amount was defeated by City Council on August 23rd. Thanks to the efforts of Alderman Gordon Price and the support of Mayor Gordon Campbell, the request was reintroduced and approved on October 4th. Alderman Price put forward a motion and spoke in favour of it. Alderman Libby Davies spoke in support and moved the full amount of \$23,500, which was again defeated. The lessor amount of \$11,750 was then approved with Aldermen Puil and Caravetta opposed. There has been discussion at council to request that the PWA Coalition and Aids Vancouver amalgamate some activities to help cut costs. Aldermen Davies and Price said that the two organizations have separate mandates and programs and that since council does not order other community organizations to establish affiliations, these should not be so ordered either.

It is a great relief for this organization to receive this core funding. A second staff person and a proper phone system will help us cope with the increasing demand for information and programs.

Our thanks go out to Alderman Gordon Price, Mayor Gordon Campbell, and all the other council members who supported us.

Dextran Sulfate Update: Seven rew people have amalgamated themselves and each made a personal decision to self-medicate with the highly exalted substance Dextran Sulfate. These seven people are courageous pioneers who have mustered up the "inner" strength to forge ahead with their healing through alternative therapies. The two main alternative therapies in S.F., L.A. and N.Y.C. are AL-721 and the wondrous Dextran Sulfate. All current reports on Dextran Sulfate at present are only anecdotal, but one Vancouver resident has been on Dextran Sulfate for one (I) month, and he claims he now feels like a stick of dynamite!

The Dextran Sulfate is coming from Tokyo, but is ordered through San Francisco Dextran Sulfate is completely legal in Canada, but only for personal consumption and personal use. Each individual places an order on a personal level.

According to Dr. Levin of Positive Action Healthcare in San Francisco, the minimum dose should be 1800 mg. which is six (6) pills daily, and the maximum dose should be 2400 mg. which is eight (8) pills daily. It is best to take Dextran sulfate on an empty stomach, so it should be taken at least two (2) hours before a meal or two (2) hours after a meal for best absorption.

The current price for Dextran Sulfate in the U.S. is \$375.00 (U.S.) for 1000 – 300 mg. tablets. Depending on whether you take 6 pills daily or 8 pills daily, one order of 1000 pills will last you anywhere from four (4) months to approximately five and one half (5 1/2) months. Converting the \$375.00 (U.S.) using current exhange rates brings the cost to \$465.00 in Canadian funds. When your Dextran Sulfate arrives in the mail there is also a bill from Canada Customs for approximately \$40.00. This brings the total cost of Dextran Sulfate to \$500.00 Canadian which is roughly \$100.00 per month.

If you are interested in more information and want to order with the next amalgamated group they will be simultaneously ordering one large purchase on Wednesday, Nov. 02, 1988. If you want to discuss any aspect of Dextran Sulfate call Mark at the Coalition (683–3381), and leave a message with Jackie. I'll get back to you as soon as possible and put you on the Amalgamated Persons Dextran-List. Of significant discourse is the responsibility of educating yourself on Dextran Sulfate. Diligent study and education, in my view, are the keynotes to creating and facilitating your own personal long-term survival. Your personal choice to exercise your right to selfmedication should be a decision based on sound research and a talk with your doctor. It is important to monitor your potential improvement, or possible, but rare, problems. For the new individuals who have just ordered as an amalgamation it has meant developing the inner skill of the Courage to BE !!!

OUR LAST POTLUCK, GRACEFULLY HOSTED BY ALEX WAS A LOVELY SUCCESS. FOR THE SIGN UP SHEET AND LOCATION FOR NEXT DINNER CALL JACKIE AT THE OFFICE(683–3381) THIS EVENT IS OPEN TO ALL MEMBERS, FRIENDS AND LOVERS. While AZT is still viewed as our greatest hope, a few others received heavy discussion at the Boston Conference, none more the use of Aerosol Pentamidine. Currently quite available in the Boston area ( and other major American cities ), it is being used more as a prophylaxis than as a treatment, with encouraging early results. A recent study conducted in Boston over six months had no cases of PCP - this study did not involve patients who had already suffered a bout of PCP, but included HIV positives and ARC patients who had a T-helper count of 400 or less. An ounce of prevention and all that. These results are reflective of ongoing studies ( non- double blind ) in L.A. and New York, and Washington, with most doctors in attendance stressing that it is currently the way to go. Very little negative reaction was cited, and side effects appear to be minimal - sore throat and cough being the primary complaints. It's benefits over I.V. pentamidine as a prophylaxis could not be stressed enough.

In the U.S., I.V. Pentamidine as a treatment is now being used over a 21 day period to treat PCP, as opposed to the earlier 14 days. It has nasty side effects ( as many of us know ), effects that build as treatment drags on. Little can be done to curb those effects, and most patients have psychological weariness by the end of treatment. Appetite suppression, nausea, headache, metal mouth, and malaise are common, as well as vein fatigue. The future of I.V. Pentamidine looks poor. As a prophylaxis once a month, the feeling was mostly negative. "Why bother " was the comment I heard most. The effects of the drug appear to be cumulative, and one day a month proves little. Personally, I agree, as it did little or nothing to prevent my last occurance of PCP.

Very little discussion was heard about AL-721. Dextran Sulfate seemed to be the new conversation grabber, though few participants had actually used the product. Combinations of Dextran Sulfate and AZT seemed to have alot of optimism surrounding them, which was also the case regarding AZT and Acyclovir combos.

K.S. lesions, if caught early, seem to respond to AZT treatment. The lesion is a reaction to infection and turns into cancer. AZT appears to be helpful before this point, but once it has progressed to the cancerous state, must be treated as such. A revived treatment for K.S. sufferers is Interferon, an earlier treatment that tended to devastate other aspects of the PWA's health, is used at lower levels, and is being more easily tolerated and apparently more effective.

With all the drugs/treatments discussed, the bottom line was the earlier the treatment was in place, the higher the possibility of effectiveness.

#### SENSE DOLLAR

A lot of us are on a limited income and it is important to reduce expenses as much as possible. One of these is to set up authorized monthly withdrawls with BC Hydro and Rogers Cable. This will save time and money by eliminating your bank's service charge for bill payments and waiting in line at the bank. Also, if you are laid up, you can have peace of mind knowing that your basic expenses are automatically paid.

Another way to immediately reduce your expenses is by monitoring your bank's monthly service charge. A survey of the major banks, trust companies, and credit unions found that the TD Bank appears to offer the best deal:

- free chequing with \$500. minimum balance
- free withdrawls from other financial institution's teller machines with a \$500, minimum balance
- \$0.24/debit or \$0.36/cheque if the balance is less than \$500. (versus \$0.40 elsewhere)
- no charge for making bill payments at Green Machine
- interest paid monthly

DR. The library has acquired a number of fabulous new items for your interest and delectation. Here is a list of some of them.

1. USPDI (U.S. Pharmaceutical Dispensing Information) 1988. This is THE compendium of all licensedand approved prescription drugs available in the United States. (We're working on getting Canadian info.) Foreign-ness aside, there is all lot of useful information here. There are two volumes, one in medicalese for health care professionals, and one for 'lay' people. These books are reference material and may not be signed out. However, feel free to photocopy the information you need. Be informed about the drugs you are taking. Use this book.

2. We now have a number of the books mentioned by Will and George, the two men from New York who spoke to us this past month on Attitudinal Healing. On the Western analytical side we have added Simonton and Simonton's <u>Getting Well Again</u> to our collection which also includes Bernie Segal's <u>Love, Medicine and Miracles</u>, among others. On the more metephysical side we have acquired six new titles having to do with such things as meditation, channelling and the like.

3. Courtesy of Chuck, we have a whole new set of information packages on various drug and holistic treatments—AL721, Dextran Sulfate, Aerosol Pentamidine, AZT, Acyclovir, and others. These are on library shelves and available free to members. Non-members will be asked for a small donation for these packets.

4. <u>The Truth about Herpes</u>. With all the "truth" about this and that being scearmed at us from magazine racks in Chinese restaurants or from grimfaced people standing under awnings, the very word, "truth", takes on an Orwellian meaning. However, this 1988 publication by Dr. Stephen Sacks, director of UBC's Herpes Clinic, is definitely the TRUTH, as much as is known about this irritating disease. It is easy to read, well organized, filled with easy explanations, drawings, and revolting colour pictures. You can browse through the sections you fell are pertinent to youand ignore the others. The great thing about this book is that it lays to rest many misconceptions about herpes and herpes treatments. (The only available and proven effective treatment is oral Acyclovir. All the ointment does, it would appear, is stain your shorts!) The information in this book is a must for all first time herpes sufferers!

The CAS supports the goals of member organizations and advocates action on serious issues in the fight against AIDS.
