What is HIV?

HIV stands for Human Immunodeficiency Virus.

It is generally believed to cause AIDS.

It can reside in the human body for many years without symptoms.

It gradually weakens the body's ability to fight off many diseases.

What is AIDS?

AIDS stands for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome.

It is the most serious stage of HIV infection.

The infected person's immune system is very much damaged.

Many life-threatening diseases such as TB or PCP, can occur in this period.

Remember:

- HIV/AIDS is a serious health issue and so are Hep. B & C, and other STDs.
- There is no physical sign or symptom for HIV infection. Only a blood test can tell.
- Prevention is the best means to avoid getting HIV/AIDS, Hepatitis B & C, and other STDs.
- Drugs can take over your life if you don't control it.
- There is no "quick fix" for addiction.
- It is healthy to reduce risk of HIV and Hep. B & C by modifying your drug use behaviour.
- Your can help a friend by passing on this information.
- If you tell people the above, you have already made a contribution to society.





Sharing needles, water, or works can lead to infection with HIV and Hepatitis B & C.



If you want to avoid getting HIV and Hep. B & C, you should try to:

USE YOUR OWN EQUIPMENT.



Used needles can contain blood of others having HIV and Hepatitis B & C. New needles can be obtained for free from the Needle Exchange Program of DEYAS and many STD clinics. They can also be purchased from most pharmacies.

CLEAN YOUR NEEDLES as follows:





Keep the bleach in the needle for at least 30 seconds each time and rinse with clean water until you can't smell the bleach.

Or you may want to consider STAYING AWAY FROM INJECTING drugs.



You can also get HIV, Hepatitis B & C, and other Sexually Transmitted Diseases (STDs) by having unprotected sex.



Therefore PRACTISE SAFER SEX by using latex condoms with water-based lubricants correctly whenever you have vaginal or anal sex.
