Volunteers Do Big Time

The following is an excerpt from a Canadian Press story in the Times-Colonist, August 31, 1989.

OTTAWA - More than five million Canadians worked as volunteers between the autumn of 1986 and the fall of 1987, contributing more than one billion hours of their time, Statistics Canada says.

Time contributed by the 5.3 million volunteers was the equivalent of about 500,000 full-time jobs for one year, the agency said.

Almost two-thirds of all volunteers held regular employment.

Women were more likely to volunteer their time. About 30 per cent of women did so compared to 24 per cent of men.

Way to go A.V.I.! Our contribution in this total is about 9,000 volunteer hours and rising steadily.
