I am writing in response to an article written in the latest issue of "The Dragon's Head" magazine. "Being H.I.V. Positive" is the name of it with a question and answer type format with Wayne Cook. I just wanted to say that out of all the brochures, pamphlets and articles, etc. that I have read over the years, this is easily one of the most informative and "barebones" truthful. Mr. Cook cut through a lot of the BS and gives an excellent testimony to what AIDS really is, and how you can and cannot contract it. His point-of-view is honest and heartfelt; his attitude, while being HIV positive himself, is incredible.

I don't think most people realize the injustices that our provincial and federal governments have done to the "pioneer" victims of this horrible disease. I agree with you that public awareness and education is a key to solving the "what if?" syndrome. I am not homosexual (I personally do not like the term "gay") nor am I HIV+. I can, however, relate to any prejudices and pressures that you may face in day-to-day life, being a member of a minority group of a sort. I am a 22 year old black male and living in Victoria that also can be rough. (Obviously, there is no comparison!)! I supported the Fashion Shows you held in conjunction with Le Chateau at Rumours and I thought it was great!

Keep up the good work....don't give up the struggle...there are people that care.

Guelph Conference Followup......

Here are some notes from an address given by Catherine Hankins at the Guelph Sexuality Conference. Catherine is a Public Health Epidemiologist at The Centre for AIDS Studies at Montreal General Hospital.

World wide there are now a million new cases of AIDS annually. In the next five years we can expect to see a shift from Africa to Asia as the focus of this disease.

Blood transfusion of infected blood is 90% effective in transmitting HIV. Unprotected sex is .1 to 1% effective.

By the year 2000, 90% of new cases in Canada will be heterosexual and there will be more women infected than men.

25 - 30% of Canadian women have had anal intercourse and for these women the risk of infection jumps from .1 - 1% to 2.3%.

A study of gay men done in Toronto indicated that 20% of the men were responsible for 80% of the partner change in the gay community. Bathhouse patrons were more likely to have female partners than bar patrons were. Also, a very small number of HIV infected individuals stated their only risk activity was oral sex, having 20 - 30 contacts a day.

Catherine cautioned AIDS educators that Intravenous Drug Users (I.D.U.) need safer sex information as well as safer needle use because they are sexually active.

Finally, in Thailand studies done between 1989 - 1991 show four separate waves of infection: I.D.U., prostitutes, wives and babies. A theory suggests amnesty was given to many thousands of prisoners under a new regimeand that many of these prisoners were using drugs while in prison and became infected through sharing needles. They then infected prostitutes who had no access to condoms. The prostitutes infected other customers who took it home to their wives who then went on to infect their babies.

Puppets Against AIDS

AIDS Vancouver Island and OXFAM Canada are pleased to announce that "Puppets Against AIDS" will be in Victoria this September as part of their Canada-wide tour August 1 to October 15th.

"Puppets Against AIDS" is the first long-term project of the African Research and Educational Puppetry Program [AREPP] and began as a road show travelling through southern Africa, an area not normally able to access AIDS education programs. The Canadian tour is closely linked with regional Fringe Festivals and promises to be a highlight of this year's festival in Victoria. OXFAM Project Coordinator Chris Morry and AVI Executive Director Dale Weston issued a joint statement in welcoming "Puppets Against AIDS", highlighting that this represents "an exciting opportunity for world AIDS issues to be brought forward to the local community."



B.C.'s Children's Hospital HIV Care Unit

U.B.C. Division of Infectious and Immunological Diseases at B.C. Childrens Hospital has created a Paediatric HIV Care Unit. As at 30 June 1990 it was estimated that there were 2,900 women of child bearing age infected with the virus.

The HIV Care Unit is a consulting service which provides ongoing care to families in collaboration with community health professionals. Areas of service include: medical care and diagnosis, counselling and support of patients and families, education, and research.

Pregnant women who are HIV positive, children born to infected mothers, and children and adolescents infected with HIV should all attempt to be referred to the HIV Care Unit.

ddC (HIV, Zalcitabine)

On July 7, 1992, the Health Protection Branch of Health and Welfare Canada announced they had issued a notice of compliance for the drug ddC, (also known as HIVID or zalcitabine). ddC is an antiretroviral drug produced and tested by Hoffmann-La Toche limited.

The treatment/observation protocol will continue for two months from July 7. This means there should be no interruption in free supplies of the drug for people who are already receiving it.

The approved therapy is for combination treatment with AZT and not for monotherapy, (i.e. using ddC only), thus those opting for monotherapy may be responsible for the cost of the drug. Pharmacare was unable to answer this question at press time.

It seems hard to imagine that the warm sun on your face or the colour it gives to one's pale body could be bad, but for everyone and particularly those of us with HIV disease there are some important facts to know about the sun.

Sunburns may seem harmless but the forms of ultraviolet radiation that cause sunburn can destroy important skin cells which produces antigens. These antigens are responsible for activating T cells which are essential to immune function. Grab some sunblock!

A report released from the United Nations Environment Program (UNEP) indicated that the depletion of Earth's ozone layer could activate the AIDS Virus. In addition, the severity of the disease will increase and it may result in a more rapid course of infection if exposure to ultraviolet B (UVB) radiation keeps increasing at the current rate. Ultraviolet B radiation is the form of solar radiation expected to increase because of the thinning of the ozone layer. In addition there are indications that UVB can suppress the immune system and skin cancer and cataracts could become more common.

There is a book in AVI's library called Living With AIDS that gives some important tips for skin care, explains the relationship between our immune system and our skin and discusses what sort of products to use and which ones to avoid. Check it out.

KECIA - WORDS TO LIVE BY.

This is an emotional 24 minute documentary about a young Native woman from Vancouver Island and the events that led up to her HIV+ status. The video follows Kecia Larkin on a tour of native communities throughout Ontario as she delivers strong messages to young people about their bodies and the AIDS virus. Also addresses such issues as: sexual abuse, alcoholism, drug addition, street life and the realities of growing up in a small Native community.

EASING THE ACHE: GAY MEN RECOVERING FROM COMPULSIVE BEHAVIORS. by David Crawford.

This 190 page self-help book is for those who feel they've had to edit themselves at "straight" 12-step support group meetings and been frustrated by that. It isn't meant as a replacement but an addition to the standard literature available. This book definitely speaks to the gay male's experience (be he addictive or not) and makes the benefits and challenges of the 12-step lifestyle clear to its readers. (published by Plume.)


