AIDS ACTIVISTS WELCOME PARLIAMENTARY REPORT

OTTAWA, February 4, 1993 -- The Canadian AIDS Society (CAS) congratulated the Parliamentary Ad-hoc Committee on AIDS on today's release of its report: AIDS: Long-Term Responses to a Crisis.

"Unanimous agreement from a non-partisan Parliamentary committee that the federal government should do more about AIDS crisis in Canada is significant" said Joan Anderson, Chair of CAS. Anderson added that "it is important that this Committee recognized that the AIDS epidemic is far from over and that the federal government must do more."

CAS welcomes the Committee's decision to recommend \$55.35 million a year for federal AIDS funding. The recommendation is in line with a brief submitted by CAS and other national organizations working against AIDS. The Canadian Haemophilia Society, Canadian Association for HIV Research, Canadian Public Health Association and CAS provided a plan to Benoit Bouchard, federal Minister of Health, urging the federal government to invest a minimum of \$55.35 million a year on AIDS initiatives.

"Now we look for action from all MPs to ensure that this Committee's recommendation for funding be acted upon by the government. Not to act in the face of this report, the expert advice and experience of scientists, community workers, and people living with HIV/AIDS would be irresponsible. The report can only assist the government in making the life and death decision now before it" stated Anderson. All federal funding for AIDS program ends March 31st.

The Committee's report also recognizes that we must build on the work of the past several years and cannot allow any gains that we have made to deteriorate. To do otherwise will result in more deaths and enormous economic, social and human costs. "To maintain current funding levels means a continuing and growing epidemic" said Richard Burzynski, Executive Director of CAS. "It is sound fiscal policy for the government to increase AIDS funding now to save even greater AIDS-related expenditures down the road" added Burzynski.

On February 10, the 4 national organizations will meet the Bouchard to discuss their joint brief and the Ad-Hoc Committee's Report that the renewed federal commitment to confront AIDS be \$55.35 million a year over the next 5 years.

The CAS is a national coalition of over 70 community-based AIDS groups confronting AIDS across Canada.


Dear Editor,

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EDITORIAL

This month I am going to use my editorial clout to give credit and appreciation to the people who have been involved with a local fund and awareness raiser called CLUB 1325.

It all started with two men and the desire to do something different in a sleepy little town called Victoria. Brent and David have just finished the second set of shows, bringing their grand total to 16 shows. RUMORS has been the venue for these shows on consecutive Tuesday nights. With the help of Terry and his staff they have had no problem raising funds, but awareness has been raised in a somewhat unique way.

It is made clear at the beginning of every show that there is a contribution jar at the door and all money goes to AIDS Vancouver Island's emergency assistance fund so awareness is raised around the show. This means the shows can have many different focuses and the audience is still conscious of why they are there.

In the first set of shows there was a game show, a murder mystery and a talent contest as well as some drag shows. At times the show has allowed for some artistic expression of issues (like AIDS and censorship) that are typically avoided by mainstream media and artists.

Both Brent and David see that the show has developed since they first had the idea. Video has been added to the shows so that they have become multi-media. Brent sees the video portion of the show expanding even more in the next set of shows.

Behind the scenes it has been a sometimes gruelling job for the two of them. Creating a show a week sometimes means no sleep for David for two nights before the show and takes a lot of time away from Brent's schooling. Production has not been without its problems: someone got food poisoning; David twisted his ankle badly. David lost his hair in one of the most memorable of the shows, but he did that on purpose.

They both see the shows as a chance to promote good energy and have a good time while raising funds and awareness in the communities of Victoria. The last show ended on the 23rd of February, but they promise another set to us in a month with six shows. Spread the word! Maybe we can wake this town up a bit and help Brent and David make a difference.

Firstly, many of you will know by now that Claudia Mimick left AIDS Vancouver Island on February 12th to return to private practice. We are presently hiring a support worker who will work four days per week and hope to have that position filled soon.

Hopefully you will also know about the new Support Group for HIV positive women being facilitated by Peggy Nako on alternate Wednesday evenings in the Living Room from 5 to 7 p.m. Dinner is provided and all HIV positive women are encouraged to attend. A number of women from the group recently attended the Women's Retreat on Bowen Island sponsored by the Positive Women's Network.

The Family, Friends, and Lovers group also continues to meet on Wednesday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. at 953 Burdett. See me for more details.

The Monday evening support group for People with HIV/AIDS (PHA) disbanded at the end of January and, for present time, we have not replaced it. I am thinking of offering a group for men only, and also wonder if there might be enough interest to establish a group for straight-identified men only. If you have an interest in either of these groups, or would like to be considered as a facilitator, give me a call at 384-1511.

Please also remember to sign up for free Massage Therapy from LaDonna on Mondays and for bodywork from Frank on Tuesdays. We have four highly talented hands in our midst and you should really give yourself the opportunity to experience this luxury.

We are also fortunate to have a volunteer who is available to assist PHA with their income tax returns free of charge. If you need help with your taxes, bring your return, any tax slips, receipts, and other such items to AVI where they will be picked up by John.

Another new area underway is a Volunteer Therapist programme. AVI will be sending letters to private practitioners in the CRD requesting that they volunteer one hour a week to working with a PHA. This would assist us in meeting the needs of our clients for counselling services and avoid the high cost of private practice.

Don't forget that Monday March 15th is the Support Services Volunteer Meeting. I'm thinking of moving the start time from 7 to 5:30 p.m. Let me know if you have any objections. Also, Kevin Doyle, a Victoria lawyer, has agreed to come and speak to us about the importance of preparing a will (including arranging for advance directives and powers of attorney). 
VOLUNTEER APPRECIATION

Everyone should have received a nomination form in the last Update. Please take a moment to do 3 things:


- 1. reflect on who you think has made an extraordinary contribution to AVI (this is the easy part!);

SPEAKERS BUREAU UPDATE

The first meeting in 1993 of the Speakers Bureau took place on Thursday, Feb. 11th at AVI, and was our first gathering since October 1992. There were many issues to be discussed and introductions to be made. In particular, it was our opportunity to finally meet our long awaited Education Coordinator, Aaron Severs as well as the new Support and Education Worker from the Island Outreach Project, Shari Dunnet. A total of 13 volunteer educators attended, a terrific turnout!

The major issues with which we grappled together were:

- the need to obtain written consent to do education speaks without compromising our mandate to educate our community, and
- 2) the suggestion to compensate PHAs for speaks which involve self-declaration. No consensus was reached for the latter issue but will be revisited by the Speakers Bureau at next meeting.

The group as a whole bandied about numerous questions and suggestions about the direction of the Speakers Bureau as a whole, including a new process for training, new speakers, and ongoing evaluating for the 'veterans'.

We discussed having a special issue related to AIDS education presented and discussed each month for the purpose of keeping us 'up to the minute' on complicated issues.

To this effect, Aaron will get the ball rolling by presenting and leading a short discussion on AIDS in the Workplace to be held at our next meeting. We will meet once a month, on every 2nd Thursday.

BOOK NOTES

Fit for Life II: Living Health by Harvey and Marilyn Diamond

This book is not as tightly focused and organized as <u>Fit for Life</u> (reviewed in the February '93 Update). The flaw is with it's presentation more than with the information. This sequel takes a slapped together approach, jumping from one separate subject to the next instead of making logical transitions from chapter to chapter. The book does generate one insight concerning how diet and environmental factors contribute to the poisoning of the planet and the human race (reflected by the immunodeficiency and degenerative diseases that have increased so much this century). A disappointing follow-up overall. <u>Fit for Life</u> is still recommended though. (Warner Books, 1988 contains 443 pages)

AIDS and It's Metaphors by Susan Sontag

"Military metaphors contribute to the stigmatizing of certain illnesses (cancer, AIDS) and, by extension, of those who are ill. It seems that some societies need to have one illness which becomes identified with evil, and attach blame to it's 'victims' -- we have the 'war on drugs' as well as against AIDS'' (pg. 11). This abuse of language is discussed in an essay-like thesis, giving us a sense of how diseases have shaped our history and mores. It rises above media irresponsibility with the insight that AIDS "...has become a repository for peoples' general fears about the future" (pg. 93), somewhat like cancer before it. This book is for those who take an interest in the sociology of immunodeficiency. (Ferrar, Straus, Girove, 1989 contains 95 pages,)

NAMES PROJECT FOUNDATION CANADA THE AIDS QUILT

(CAS) On January 22nd, 1993, the Names Project Foundation - Canada, transferred the Quilt panels to the Canadian AIDS Society (CAS).

In a December 7, 1992 letter the Foundation informed CAS that the Names Project Foundation's Board of Directors had decided to dismantle the Foundation and asked CAS to take care of the Quilt. The CAS Board of Directors agreed to take custodianship of the Quilt and has assumed the rental of the small office space in Halifax.

Please note the Foundation itself has not been transferred, only the Quilt panels. We are currently seeking advice from our lawyer to better understand CAS' legal situation.

What's next? The CAS Board will discuss options at our next Board meeting February 26-28. In the meantime, please note the following:

- 1. The Names Project Foundation Canada is no longer functioning. Please do not direct people nor panels to their Halifax address and phone number.
- Groups will be informed as soon as new management of the Quilt can be facilitated and a new contact number is arranged.
- CAS is committed to taking care of the Quilt until there is new management, however, CAS has not replaced the Foundation.
- 4. CAS is not able to receive panels. CAS is not able to take on request of the display of the Quilt. Please hold off on sending panels or requesting a display until there is a new management of the Quilt.
- 5. CAS Regional Directors and PLWHIV/AIDS Regional Directors will take concerns or suggestions from Member Groups and Associates as we try to problem-solve this difficult issue.

Special thanks to Michael McDonald, PLWHIV/AIDS Atlantic Regional Director for his work in Halifax and to Donne Smith, Atlantic Regional Director, AIDS Nova Scotia, N.S. PWA Coalition and AIDS Committee of Newfoundland and Labrador for your assistance.
