

...FROM THE HEART

This is a letter I received from a contact person for a speak at the University of Victoria. I think it says it all from a student who, along with the AVI speaker, gave us permission to print it in the Update.

November 26, 1993

I was really glad to listen to your talk today because we were able to hear your real feelings which we can't understand from other people. Before I came to Canada I was not interested in or I didn't concern myself about HIV or AIDS. In Japan unfortunately there are lots of people who are afraid of this disease and have some wrong ideas because they don't have enough education also our society has not been ready to (accept) it yet. So we have to do something about these problems. I was so shocked when you told us about your family's reaction. Before you came, in class we had read an article about AIDS. In that we read about a man who was separated from his family when he told his family that he was gay. That made me feel so sad but I thought that was a very special case because I believe families have to help and understand each other. However in the meantime I started to wonder, if my children get HIV, will I be able to be normal and help them? I really want do that, also I believe I should or I have to help them but I can't imagine the situation. So while I was listening to you I cried, but I hope you didn't misunderstand my feelings if you noticed me. I was really pleased that you came and told us about AIDS. To be honest, before I had heard about AIDS some times but these sources were just telling me physical things so I couldn't get rid of my stereotype. However today I was able to learn and know more about the emotional side of AIDS, my ideas about AIDS have changed a lot. You helped me to do it. I have started to want to do something for people with AIDS for the first time. I don't know how I can explain my thanks to you. You are in my thoughts. You are in my heart. I wish you good luck and lots of hope.

EDUCATION

THE AIDS HELPLINE/RECEPTION is expanding its hours! Effective February 1, and for a six month trial period, we will be operating Monday to Thursday 9 am to 9 pm, and Friday 9 am to 5 pm. It's all part of a concerted effort to provide better service to our communities...the service that you want when you want it.

The move, which was enthusiastically backed by our Helpline/Reception volunteers and supported by staff, will mean that the Resource Centre will also stay open late. Crucial to the success of this venture will be the promotion of the AIDS Helpline/Reception across CRD, Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. And some of this has already begun. The AVI Helpline is listed in the upcoming BC AIDS Directory to be published from Vancouver this spring.

THE MEN'S PROJECT is moving right along. Group members held a Christmas potluck and have been busy gathering information from other community outreach programs geared to gay and bisexual men.

Specifically, we are looking at the role that the local police can play as a support, or at least not an obstacle, to our program. The folks at AIDS Vancouver's Man to Man Program have been a valuable resource, and we have also gotten input from as far afield as AIDS Saskatoon, AIDS Committee of Toronto, AIDS Committee of Ottawa, and several other groups. We are also doing some qualitative research around the activity in some of the PSEs (public sex environments) of Victoria. The Men's Project welcomes new male volunteers. We would also like to thank the members of Prime Timers Victoria for their ongoing support, culinary skills, and enthusiasm!

ISLAND OUTREACH PROJECT has been busy doing some intensive planning with the Cowichan Valley AIDS Network (CVAN). CVAN members, led by Darlene Taylor, have had three brainstorming sessions with Shari since November '93. The results are a shared vision, a statement of community needs and available resources, and some ideas for receiving greater support from other local agencies. At the latest meeting in January, the group members who took part explored the formation of committees, eg. education, support, needle exchange, etc. The whole process has been incredibly exciting,

and is a real tribute to the ongoing efforts and determination of the residents in the Cowichan Valley.

Another priority for Island Outreach has been assisting in the establishment of a needle exchange program in Campbell River. The North Island Needle Exchange has just hired a nurse and outreach worker and will be up and running in that community within the next month or so.

AND FINALLY, there is the wrap-up to World AIDS Day. From an educational standpoint, the activities surrounding December 1 were a great success. A "Thinking AIDS Globally" workshop was held in Courtenay with local teens, and participants produced the video "Penis Boy" with its humorous safer sex message. In addition, the workbook for "Thinking AIDS Globally" was released across BC on Dec. 1. A coproduction of OXFAM Canada, VIDEA (Victoria International Development Education Association), NANSO (Namibia National Students' Organization) and AVI, this workbook is now being promoted across Canada through the Canadian Public Health Association.

The Education Committee is gathering representatives from AVI's educational programs. The first meeting will take place on February 3. Our new and invigorated chair is Linda Bouchard. She is a new Board Member and a participant in the Women's Project. There will be one representative from all streams in the Education Dept.: the Women's Project, Men's Project, Speakers Bureau, Resource Centre and the AIDS Helpline/Reception. Our first meeting should help lay the groundwork for some goals and objectives.

Celebration of Life '93 was presented at the Royal Theatre on Dec. 1, as well. As Victoria's Second Annual AIDS Benefit, the evening featured over 200 performers and was attended by approximately 250 people. Another important event as part of World AIDS Day was Day Without Art (DWA), which made its debut in our fair city on Dec. 1. DWA symbolizes a moment in time to mark the decimation to the arts community caused by AIDS. The Art Gallery of Greater Victoria joined forces with AVI, MUSAIC, Michael MacLennan, and other volunteers to produce a moving tribute to the lives which have been lost. Coverage by local media of World AIDS Day events was excellent, too: DWA made the cover of "Monday" magazine, and was the lead news story on CHEK-TV that evening. Celebration of Life '93 was covered by most media outlets in the city as well. A heartfelt thank you goes out to all the individuals who helped make World AIDS Day '93 a day to remember.

Volunteer Appreciation Awards

The time is fast approaching when we at AVI like to focus our attention on the wonderful work & commitment displayed by our many volunteers. During National Volunteer Recognition Week in Canada April 17-23, two very special awards will be presented -- the Shawn Costello Memorial Award for Volunteer of the Year and the Michael Redfern Memorial Award for Speaker of the Year.

Shawn Costello was a well known dancer who, together with his dance partner Lynda Raino, thrilled audiences with their inspiring performances. He was also secretary to the Board of Directors at AVI in 1986 and helped to coordinate subsequent World AIDS Day events. Shawn died in February 1989 and it is in his memory that volunteers and members of AVI are asked to nominate individuals who have made an extraordinary contribution to this organization.

A nomination form is enclosed with this Update and others may be obtained from the office.

Michael Redfern was a supporter of AVI and PWAs long before he became a volunteer. As a performer he helped to raise funds through Rumors Cabaret to support those living with HIV/AIDS. In July, 1991, realizing that his life too was threatened, Michael became an active member of AVI's Speakers Bureau, giving a very powerful gift of awareness to school students and community groups. Michael died in May 1992 and it is in his memory that Rumors and AVI have established an award to be presented annually to the Speakers Bureau volunteer who has given outstanding service in the field of HIV/AIDS education. Nomination forms will be sent to the agencies and groups who have benefitted from our Speakers. If you are a volunteer/member of AVI and wish to nominate a speaker, please obtain a nomination form from the office. Deadline for nominations for both awards is March 11, 1994.


VOLUNTEER TRAINING

Curtis has asked that we submit an accounting of our weekly "nights out". Our anonymity has been our cloak; not of many colours, mind you, but comforting none the less.

We have been meeting every Wednesday night for just over five years now at 923 Burdett Avenue. The Group is composed of family, friends and partners who by now must number over sixty. Not that we cater to such a grand gathering each Wednesday evening, but we have met and shared with a large number of friends our concerns and cares and joys regularly and patiently in the pleasant room that the Sisters of St. Ann graciously offer AVI.

In five years we have experienced the whole spectrum of responses to HIV/AIDS with which the community at large is familiar: anger, sorrow, rejection, loneliness, relief, joy, acceptance -- and -- LOVE. Total, complete and nonjudgmental love above all. There have been nights when Kleenex was in demand and other evenings when laughter took over. We have regulars who show up frequently and others who return periodically just to check in and check up. We have had as many as 23 and as few as the Facilitator alone. But we were always there!

We have been a support and sounding board for each other and have gained an immense respect for the resilience and strength of the human creature. Likely the most impressive contributors have been those PWAs who have come and gone and who shared with us their hopes and their fears, who gave to us those things that we most needed and which we most prize. We would like to thank them and the Sisters and AVI for allowing us to quietly go on about our business.

STREET OUTREACH

Our busiest or peak periods at the Storefront are much later in the evening now than in previous months. This is partially due to the heavy police surveillance in the downtown area, as well as the many arrests and subsequent red zoning incarcerations.

The high-grade killer heroin available in Victoria continues to take its toll with 38 clients succumbing to heroin overdoses since last spring. Needle exchange staff have posted information and given verbal warnings when doing needle exchanges with clients.

Shelter continues to be the major problem for the majority of street people as shelters fill quickly. Many more youths are congregating in the downtown area with subsequent outbursts of violence, and violence in the downtown area seems to be on the increase. Violence directed at women is on the increase as well, and it isn't uncommon for a woman totally unrelated to a dispute to suddenly become the recipient of a blow. Startling numbers of women are hit or punched in the face by a complete stranger. And isolated incidents of what may begin as a confrontation between youths soon escalate, involving anyone, event the innocent passerby.

It appears there is a greater pressure for young people to enter the sex triangle industry this year - usually the major recruitment is in the spring. However, the reverse has happened, with recruitment in full swing in October.

From January 1 - September 30, 1993 there has been an 80% increase in the number of client contacts for needle exchange in comparison to the same period in 1992.

The needle exchange program normally slows down somewhat in winter months, after the tourist season ends. However, we have experienced an all-time record for used syringes returned in September: 145% were returned, which means we are receiving as returns not only the syringes we distributed, but syringes from other sources as well (an actual 45% more than the number we give out). Even with the whopping return rate, we still find used syringes discarded in alleys and parking lots during our nightly checks.

There has been heavy police presence in the downtown area, and several reports of VCP confiscating both new and used syringes from the clients.

On a brighter note, the street nurse is kept busy with HIV testing, HEP B and flu vaccine; and thus far, no positive test results for HIV invection. Finally, many thanks to people who regularly give to Storefront -- a surplus of wool blankets has been donated, which have been very much appreciated during these cold nights.





Strategic Planning: a Journey Into the Future

Today weak sunshine flows in soft lines through the venetian blinds, filtering the light, warming the room. Winter feels short this year; already bulbs push through the cold earth, and boulevard trees are in blossom. Spring is in the air, and so is change, especially at AIDS Vancouver Island.

At AVI's Annual General Meeting in October, members endorsed a Strategic Planning process. After preliminary work contributed by staff and volunteer Board members, the Strategic Planning Committee is ready to go public. Over the next six months, we'll be asking for your ideas - as members, clients, volunteers, colleagues and associates. We're embarking on a journey of discovery, and we'd like you to travel with us.

AVI has made significant contributions to AIDS education, support and advocacy over the past eight years. Because there are many more roads to travel, and much work still to be done, we need you on this journey. 
