WORLD AIDS DAY AIDS and the Family

December 1 marks World AIDS Day once again. This year's theme is AIDS and the Family to reflect the fact that 1994 has been named International Year of the Family.

World AIDS Day is more than simply a one day event that we observe and can then pack tidily away for another calendar year. Rather, it remains a clarion call to all individuals in the community AIDS movement to renew our energies in providing support, education and advocacy for People Living with HIV/AIDS (PWAs).

Worldwide, statistics indicate an estimated 16 million adults plus one million children have been infected with HIV. Three-quarters of these cases are heterosexually transmitted. Moreover, four million of the above HIV cases have progressed to AIDS. Women, men and children with HIV/AIDS live on all continents, with Asia and Latin America being the new hot spots for the disease.

This year's theme has real significance. It speaks to members of all kinds of families (traditional and otherwise) to become actively involved in the care, support and love of PWAs. As HIV disease progresses, many people prefer to live and to be cared for in their homes and communities with family and friends around. Moreover, a lot of practical duties may be handled more easily and for less cost by carepartners in the home -- a safer and less isolating place for some than a hospital bed.

AIDS and the Family also reminds us of chosen family. Ours is an age in which AIDS is continually being de-gayed. Yet, it is crucial to step back and recognize the ongoing toll upon and contributions by members of our lesbian, gay and bisexual communities in confronting HIV/AIDS. In our efforts to get the message out that AIDS affects everyone, we

must not gloss over the need for ongoing, creative, and targeted outreach to the gay community. Infection rates are once again soaring among young gay and bisexual men in the US; is Canada far behind?

We must let the message of World AIDS Day ring clearly and guide us in our activities throughout the coming year. Families -- however we define them -- can be vital allies in helping to let go of old family values. Homophobia, AIDS-phobia, racism, sexism, and ageism all present large obstacles to stemming the spread of HIV and to providing support for PWAs. It's time that families began playing a more positive and active role in our community AIDS work.

EDUCATION

Workshops

Is workshop a noun or a verb? I mean, I workshop, you workshop...we workshop. Mmmmm...

Seriously, though, workshops (in their endless varieties) have been a mainstay of our work in Education Services during the past month. To begin, a one day workshop called Acting on AIDS -- A Safer Theatre Workshop was held on Saturday Nov. 19 in Victoria. In anticipation of World AIDS Day on Dec. 1 (see cover story), the purpose of this day was to bring together community AIDS workers, actors, and young people so that they may learn and share theatre skills and information on AIDS as a global issue.

The keynote facilitator on Nov. 19 was Tisa Chifunyise, who does AIDS education through the use of street theatre in her native Zimbabwe. It is hoped that a lot of skill building, peer learning and fun occurred...and also that some follow-up to the day may occur. To this end, representatives of the community AIDS groups up-island were invited, as well as members of the theatre, youth, and multicultural communities in CRD. The day was co-sponsored by OXFAM Canada, VIDEA, the Inter-Cultural Association of Victoria, Action Comedy Theatre Troupe, and AVI.

Think Positive is a new series of workshops (13) being planned with and for members of the Persons with HIV/AIDS (PWA) community in CRD. The workshops, to be launched on Jan. 17,1995 and to occur bi-weekly in the Living Room at AVI, aim to provide PWAs and their partners with practical skills to tackle a number of day-to-day challenges. This includes: what resources exist in CRD; financial management; nutrition; safer sex and sexuality; wills and powers of attorney; and parenting and HIV to name just a few topics. The project is a joint effort between Victoria Persons with AIDS Society, VARCS, and AVI (Support and Education Services).

HIV and Tuberculosis -- A Community Response is the name of comprehensive and interesting workshop that Claire and I attended on Nov. 4 and 5 in Vancouver. Using a Train the Trainer format, the Canadian AIDS Society sponsored event sought to give participants from across BC a deeper understanding of HIV/TB, and how this knowledge can then be transported back to our home communities. It is my hope that an inservice early in the New Year can be provided to the other staff at AVI.

That about wraps things up for this issue. My thanks to our first class staff (Barb and Shari), our new Chair (Bill), and to our wonderful volunteers who have given yet another year of boundless energy and enthusiasm (and don't forget hours!) in getting the HIV prevention message out across the Island. My best wishes to one and all for a happy, safer, and restful Holiday Season.

STREET OUTREACH

The last six months at the storefront have been busy. We've done an unprecedented number of needle exchanges: more than 50,000 syringes to 700 injection drug users. Our drop-in and nurse's clinic has been equally busy. We have also produced several pamphlets (tips for injection drug users; what prostitutes need to know about HIV testing; needlestick injuries in the workplace; and a weekly "Bad Date Sheet" for sex trade workers); information cards (about Tuberculosis; water-based lubricant; what to do if the police want to talk to you; safer oral sex and safer drug use) and matchbooks with a safer drug message.

Peter McDougall is organizing a needle exchange steering committee, in preparation for his needle exchange program starting in Duncan in December. The remainder of his time is spent doing community development and education in the Cowichan Valley and working two days a week at the storefront in Victoria.

The holiday season is fast approaching and we're starting to make our plans. We have neither the facilities or the space to host a meal for our clients, but we would like to provide them with some food between December 20-30. Contributions of baked goods, vegetable sticks and dips, fruit, cheese and crackers, sandwiches and juice would be greatly appreciated. In addition, we are organizing donations of clothing and toys for clients' children under 12.

Our on-going wish list consists of: a radio/cassette deck; eye glass cases; socks; gloves; sweat pants/shirts; belts; makeup; and toiletries. If you can offer donations or want to volunteer with the Street Outreach program please feel free to call 384-1345 after 4 pm.

ISLAND OUTREACH

Several "Vancouver (and Gulf) Islanders" attended the 8th annual BC AIDS Conference in Vancouver, November 6th to 8th. Among us, we represented AIDS Service organizations in Victoria and across the Island, as well as those agencies and organizations we work closely with - Health Unit staff, needle exchange program workers and professionals in the health care field. AVI was well represented, with both staff and board members being present.

Following the Canadian AIDS Society's initiative for AIDS Awareness Week, this year's theme for the conference was "Focus on Youth". Unfortunately, that focus was sometimes illusive, especially during the opening plenary where youth were barely mentioned at all. However, there were a number of sessions that dealt with issues relating to youth, and the closing plenary featured a panel of youth addressing various issues including positive youth, gay, lesbian and bisexual youth, and AIDS in the family. For me, these youth who presented were the highlight.

Recently, a youth AIDS organization was formed in Vancouver - YouthCo. (Youth Community Outreach). Members of YouthCo contributed to several sessions at the conference, and they were also involved in bringing 30 youth delegates from across the province to the conference, providing for some formal and informal peer education and organizing.

I was fortunate to work with one of the founders and codirectors of YouthCo at the conference. Marc Mertens and I co-facilitated two sessions - Youth Talking About Hot Safer Sex, and HIV/AIDS: Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Youth. For the purposes of the workshop on Youth Talking About Hot Safer Sex, we asked the participants to identify themselves as "youth" or "non-youth". The participatory session then took these two groups through an examination of some of the barriers for youth in negotiating safer sex such as assertiveness and negotiation skills, power in oneself and in relationship, and self esteem. We identified specific strategics to address some of these issues. There was also a chance for youth to speak to the "non-youth" present as to what was working and what they wanted to see changed in the way of AIDS education.

HIV/AIDS: Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Youth focused on some of the particular issues faced by those young people whose sexuality isn't part of the school curriculum - what particular issues exist for youth who may feel very unsafe to come out, may have no role models, no support at home, no knowledge of services available to them - or no access to services if they live in a small community or rural area. Adding to these, are the challenges of negotiating safer sex in

the age of AIDS, the perception that lesbian sex is safe, and the assumption that AIDS is an older gay male disease. The issues obviously can become very complex. During the workshop we identified the particular barriers - homophobia, self-esteem, and invisibility among them, and also looked at specific strategies to address the needs of these youth.

If anyone is interested in more information, a report is being prepared from these workshops and can be obtained from AVI through the Island Outreach Project at P.O. Box 3156, Courtenay, BC V9N 5N4, or call 335-1171.

In general, life "up-island" remains very busy - there are more and more requests for educational sessions, and the Island Outreach Project is continuing to make contact with People Living With HIV/AIDS in communities across the Island. We also continue to work with communities to develop local responses to HIV/AIDS and now have a Vancouver Island AIDS Network that brings together people from Port Hardy, Courtenay, Port Alberni, Parksville, Nanaimo and Duncan. More news in the new year... In the meantime, wishing you all a safer (!) and happy Holiday Season (and if you don't celebrate any of the many options at this time of year stay warm!). See you in '95!

Think Positive Workshop Series




