# 1995 - 96 YEAR IN REVIEW

## **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**



ADS Vancouver Island has experienced unprecedented growth over the last year. Since my tenure with the

agency began just one year ago, the agency has taken time for review, evaluation and planning in order for our programs to adapt to the changing face of HIV/AIDS. Midway through the second decade of the epidemic and the second decade of service through this agency, we are re-thinking approaches to meet the evolving needs of people living with HIV/AIDS, education and harm reduction.

In the immediate future, AIDS Vancouver Island will work hard to implement its Strategic Plan, a benchmark document that was recommended by our Board of Directors in 1996. The strategic planning process included

Island-wide consultations with people living with HIV/AIDS, members, volunteers, community groups, other AIDS service organizations, Board directors and staff.

Renewing Canada's National AIDS Strategy continues to be an important focus of our advocacy work. Community support for our efforts to renew this critical source of federal funding will be sought over the coming year.

1995/96 was a year characterized by the phrase strengthening the foundations. 1996/97 will be a year of focusing to meet the need. With the commitment of volunteers, members, Board, and staff at AIDS Vancouver Island, we will continue the work of providing programs and services to people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS across Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands.

## **VOLUNTEER SERVICES**

The promotion of personal growth and commitment among volunteers is essential: the organization could not function without volunteer energy and dedication. At any point in time, AIDS Vancouver Island employs 160 or more active volunteers who have completed 26 hours of "core training" and additional training for specific programs. Approximately 35 professionals and complementary therapists also volunteer their expertise.

Over the coming months, Volunteer Services looks forward to implementing some of the recommendations from a recently completed volunteer services evaluation.

A major improvement will be the establishment of a regular in-service program for all our volunteers. We also look forward to working with the Victoria AIDS Respite Care Society and the Victoria Persons With AIDS Society on joint volunteer workshops to further a sense of mutual respect and support.

Over the past months, we have seen substantial growth to meet the needs of new and existing programs at AIDS Vancouver Island. It remains an exciting challenge for the department to adjust to new initiatives and SUPPORT SERVICES services, creating new volunteer opportunities and adapting existing ones to meet increasing demands in both Victoria and Nanaimo.

## STREET OUTREACH SERVICES

Victoria's street-involved population is growing dramatically, and so is the demand for AIDS Vancouver Island's SOS and needle exchange program. Our case load now stands at over 2,000 individuals and the program registers more than 70 new clients each month. Between April 1995 and March 1996, we distributed 130,000 needles and 60,000 condoms through our new storefront location in downtown Victoria. Our satellite needle exchange in the Cowichan Valley provides similar outreach to injection drug users in the Duncan area.

In response to the unprecedented growth of Victoria's street communities, we opened a new facility in Victoria's Commercial Alley, which offers a number of important operational advantages.

With the cooperation and support of the local community, a dedicated team of volunteers and professional staff, AIDS Vancouver Island operates one of the oldest and most successful needle exchanges in Canada.

The impact of our Street Outreach Services (SOS) and needle exchange on the health of our community is dramatic: the estimated HIV prevalence rate of 1.5% among Victoria's IDUs is one of the lowest rates in North America. SOS is saving lives.

In response to AIDS Vancouver Island's Strategic Plan, Support Services is devoting more resources to education and advocacy for people living with HIV. Better access to psycho-social supports for people affected and infected by HIV are priority in the face of growing client numbers and the increasing complexity of HIV disease and its treatments.

Quality Island-wide support and advocacy programs have been identified as another priority, as has better support for youth, women, members of the street community, and long-term survivors of HIV. New on the support landscape is the psychological impact of learning that HIV may no be terminal, at least for some. AIDS Vancouver Island has begun to consider programs for people returning to the work

In response to changing demographics and new drug "cocktails" that appear to extend the lives of many people living with HIV and AIDS, Support Services is reorganizing its programs to anticipate the ever-changing landscape of HIV disease.

The Education Services department has undergone considerable chang innovation during the past year. A research coordinator is now on site to undertake an. evaluation of Education Services and to coordinate the M.A.R.S. Project, an innovative research initiative that examines how selfesteem, self-identity and other circumstantial factors affect risk behaviours among men who have sex with men, a population that remains at marked risk for HIV transmission. An outreach position has also been established to address the prevention needs of gay men in the Victoria area.

## Men's Outreach Project

Funded by the AIDS Community Action Program, a federal initiative, the Men's

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Outreach Project promotes supportive environments for men who have sex with men (MSM) to reduce their risk for HIV infection. Over the coming year, the Men's d. ach Project will provide outreach in bars and public sex environments; develop a volunteer outreach team; and hold two community forums. The project's goal is critical: to empower men to make informed choices about their sexual health.

## The M.A.R.S. Project

The M.A.R.S. (Men's Attitudes about Relationships and Sexuality) Project explores how issues such as self-identity and other personal, psychological and economic factors influence the unsafe or

self-identity and other personal, psychological and economic factors influence the unsafe or safer sexual practices of men who have sex with men (MSM) on Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. Using a qualitative research approach, the project employs a variety of innovative methods to collect data. Approximately 100 men will participate the gh confidential interviews, diaries and focus groups that encourage the disclosure of personal stories and experiences.

## The Evaluation Project

The BC Health Research Foundation has funded AVI to evaluate three of its education services: the Speakers' Bureau; HelpLine; and the Men's Outreach Project. Using surveys and focus groups, we will seek to determine the relevance, use and effectiveness of these core programs.

## Collaborative Initiatives

Increasingly, Education and Support Services are working together to develop educational opportunities for people living with HIV/AIDS and other service agencies affected by the epidemic. Together we held a series of *Think Positive* workshops that dealt with such issues as understanding blood work and understanding the cial services system. We also presented a successful workshop on women and HIV for women's service organizations. Further collaboration is in the works.

## Speakers' Bureau & HelpLine

The two pillars of Education Services remain vital ingredients in AIDS Vancouver Island's programming. In 1995/96, the Speakers' Bureau offered close to 300 presentations, reaching approximately 20,000 people across Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands. The HelpLine, staffed by dedicated volunteers, fielded more than 1200 confidential HelpLine calls and over 20,000 business calls. Volunteer support for these services is vital to their success. More than 50 people were trained in the past year.

## Resource Centre

Developments at the Resource Centre include a new home with its own discrete space and a review of our current holdings that was recently completed by a summer student. Determining the need for a broader collection, new books, videos and journals are arriving to round out AIDS Vancouver Island's holdings.

## REGIONAL PROGRAMS

AIDS Vancouver Island's Nanaimo office opened its doors on World AIDS Day, December 1st, 1995. In conjunction with the opening, the "Nanaimo and District AIDS Collective" formally merged with AIDS Vancouver Island to offer services from the new facility.

AIDS Vancouver Island's Nanaimo centre has grown considerably since December, and now offers a wide range of education and support programs, from support groups to training for provincial financial assistance workers and workplace policy consultations. In collaboration with AVI's Communications & Fund Development department, the Nanaimo centre held a successful 4th Annual AIDS Benefit (a benefit for the Financial Assistance Fund to mid-island communities); launched the 1996 AIDS Awareness Week Campaign with other related agencies; and organized the 1st Annual Nanaimo Walks for AIDS, a project that achieved unprecedented corporate, team and individual support.

AIDS Vancouver Island's community developments efforts have made inroads to areas north of Nanaimo since February of '93, when an outreach pilot project was launched. Remote support services have provided assistance to a growing number of HIV+ clients in rural communities and semi-urban areas. We have been instrumental in the establishment of the Vancouver Island AIDS Network (VIAN), an information forum for community AIDS groups, health unit representatives, First Nations groups involved in HIV/AIDS awareness, Island needle exchange programs and community associations.

## FUND DEVELOPMENT

AIDS Vancouver Island's fund development committee has done considerable work over the last year. Now in its second year of operation, the committee completed a strategic plan for the department in the early summer, followed by the development of an exciting work plan for the coming year.

Much of the department's accomplishments were shared between Victoria's three AIDS service organizations through our work on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Artists For AIDS Lottery, Victoria Cares and the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Victoria Walks For AIDS. Knowledge and experience gained from these events is considerable, and our systems for tracking donors and potential supporters are now the best and most affordable available.

New on the landscape is the Nanaimo office and its unfailing commitment to fundraising since its opening last winter. The success of Nanaimo's first Walk For AIDS on September 29, 1996, held in conjunction with the Victoria Walk, is the first in a series of initiatives that will involve the Nanaimo community in AIDS awareness and support.

More than ever, cooperative effort and support from wider circles of the general community will be necessary to sustain and augment services for people living with AIDS.

## **EDUCATION SERVICES**

## **HIV/AIDS** and Prisons

Many of you have no doubt heard about the alarming increases in HIV infections in Canadian prisons over the past number of years. Currently, HIV infection among prisoners in Canadian prisons is more than ten times higher than among the general population and studies also show that every third prisoner is infected with the hepatitis C virus. The Canadian HIV/AIDS Legal Network and the Canadian AIDS Society recently published HIV/AIDS in Prisons: Final Report. The report acknowledges that in federal prisons, some positive initiatives are underway such as bleach distribution, introduction of anonymous HIV testing, and education of prisoners by fellow prisoners. However, the report is critical of the Correctional Service of Canada for failing to implement a longer term strategy to deal with the many issues raised by HIV/AIDS and drug use. Ralf Jurgens, Project Coordinator for the Legal Network says, "the system is reluctant to face the reality of HIV and drug use in prisons". Other prison systems, in Switzerland, Germany and Australia have made sterile injection equipment or methadone treatment accessible to inmates. Evaluation of such programs has demonstrated clear positive results: the health of prisoners improved, a decrease in needle sharing was observed, there was no increase in drug consumption, and needles were not used as weapons. Prison staff, initially skeptical, now support such programs. Jurgens adds, "Making bleach, sterile needles, and methadone programs available to inmates does not mean condoning drug use, but it is a necessary and pragmatic public health measure".

AVI, through Education, Support and Street Outreach Services is engaged in ongoing education and support of both inmates living with HIV/AIDS and those seeking information and tools to prevent its spread.

## Helpline

Congratulations to all Helpline volunteers. The past couple of months all shifts have been filled and volunteers are continuing to provide a high level of service to callers. With the help of a Royal Roads University student, AVI is currently developing a promotion plan that will increase the profile and use of the Helpline. Stay tuned for more details and get ready for more calls. We're still holding regular Helpline volunteer meetings. They're held on the last Wednesday of each month at 5:30pm at AVI. Attendance has been low recently and, in fact, no one came to the last meeting. That meant that Jim and I got to eat all the pizza. Well, not quite all of it. That's right there is pizza at every meeting. I encourage all of you to come out to these meetings to discuss mutual concerns, talk about calls or meet other volunteers. We're taking a break for Christmas. The next meeting will be January 29 @ 5:30 pm. Hope to see you there.

## STREET OUTREACH

The Island Outreach Committee, staff and community members will engage in a planning process to establish goals and plan activities for the program. Community de pment, education and support activities will continue with an emphasis on trying to provide seamless service delivery on the Island.


The Central Vancouver Island Health Unit Community HIV/AIDS Prevention Education Project, known simply as the Nanaimo Education Project is complete. AVI extends its thanks to the Central Vancouver Heath Unit for both funding and supporting the education project. In recognition of the success of this project, education has also become a regular part of the services offered out of the Nanaimo office. Over the next few months education will focus on HIV/AIDS education for youth workers as a way to teach youth at risk and continue its work in policy and education in local workplaces. A new partnership with Malaspina College will provide supplemental courses to nursing and social work students. AVI has partnered with Tillicum Haus and the Health Unit (again!) to provide a coordinated approach to HIV education in grades 9 to 11 in Nanaimo schools.

Support is of course an important service offered out of the Nanaimo office. Our support and outreach workers carry a case load of almost 60 clients. There are a variety of support groups in both Nanaimo and Campbell River. In the upcoming months support will create a supplement to our newsletter offering information of special interest to people living with HIV/AIDS. A series of workshops for people living with HIV/AIDS will be offered. Another exciting plan is to partner with the Harewood community kitchen program to create a group who will cook together on a monthly basis.

Education, Outreach and Support are in many ways overlapping services in Nanaimo. All the services are mobile when necessary. That means that people don't need to get to the Nanaimo office to access service. Support makes home visits, education goes to where the audience is, and outreach will be making regular tours of the North Island as well as responding to client and community need.

On December 2, 1996 the Nanaimo office will celebrate it's first birthday with an open house showcasing programs and staff. Call 250-753-2437 for more information.

Personal interview and assessment; Choose your own fitness/rehab program; Therapeutic prescribed excercise; Nutritional assessment and counselling; Stress management; Pain and symptom management; On-going follow-up and assessment; Free fitness facility memberships.
