In the spring of 1995, Education and Support Services at AVI launched Think Positive, a series of educational workshops for People Living with HIV/AIDS. The aim of these workshops was to provide people with information that would be useful in promoting health in their daily lives. Last year, the series was held again.

This year, the workshops or information sessions return in a slightly different format. There will be two separate series. The first will be available to people who are able to attend in the daytime. These workshops will focus on understanding viral load, housing and social assistance issues and coping with stress. A brown bag lunch will be provided to all who attend. The other series will be held in the evening and will be available to people who work in the daytime or are otherwise unavailable during the day. This series will also look at viral load, pension and disability as well as issues of disclosure of HIV status and relationships in HIV. Refreshments will be served. All HIV-positive members are invited to attend any of the eight workshops.

BOOK REVIEW

Mindblowing Sex in the Real World. With a title like that how can one not pick up the book for a peek! This 20-something oriented book is written by Sari Locker who is getting down to the realities of sex, love & relationships in the nineties.

She covers a variety of topics which are hitting young people today and talks about them with frankness and fun. Her day time job is that of a sexual health radio host and public speaker, and she has incorporated some of her callers opinions and questions into the book.

This book is easy to read, offering the reader some valuable insights into such questions as the relationship between sex and love, group sex, condom usage, and of course HIV/AIDS. The book is definitely aimed at a particular audience - those in their teens and early 20's. I was skeptical of the book at first thinking it would be just another fluff piece by some dippy self-proclaimed educator, but her credentials hold up and she has produced an informative and useful book. I would recommend this for the curious, the interested, and for parents or other people involved with youth. This book focuses mostly on heterosexuals, but not exclusively.

FAF Task Force The FAF Task Force had a problem solving session on January 10 to identify practical and effective strategies that will address the problems facing the FAF. Specifically, the Task Force is working towards developing a program that will provide direct support to PWAs who have a specific and pressing financial need; has a predictable and sustainable funding base; and is administratively efficient.

Task Force participants include Support and Fund Development staff, several members of the PWA Caucus, Board and our partners at VARCS and VPWA. A sub-committee of the Task Force will now review the Issues and Options identified at the problem solving session and prepare recommendations that I expect will go to the Board in February.

I would like to thank all of you who have provided us with constructive suggestions on how to restructure the FAF, and particularly the PWAs who attended the FAF meeting in December. Your feedback and suggestions have been really valuable in helping to ensure that the program meets the needs of those it is designed to serve. This Board is committed to communicating directly and regularly with PWAs, our members and partners as we move towards a more client driven agency.

Changes to the Board I would like to thank Cindy Jamieson for all that she has given to our agency during her time on the Board. Cindy has decided to take a break from Victoria, and has therefore stepped down from her position on the Board. Cindy has served as our Secretary and I will certainly miss her candor and direct approach to problem solving. All the best Cindy!

Finally, the purpose of these monthly reports from the Board is to provide information directly to members.
