The mission of the Men's Outreach Project is To empower gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men to make informed choices about their own sexual health and reduce HIV infections.

The Men's Outreach Project is involved in community forums, active outreach to men in bars, public sex environments and special events, as well as a new HIV negative support group called Staying Negative.

The Staying Negative support group has one important goal - to keep men negative. Staying Negative focuses on the emotional and psychological well-being of HIV negative men. Men being men, they rarely, if ever, openly discuss their emotions, and if you're a man having sex with other men in an epidemic, this can have disastrous results. Feelings of anxiety, guilt, despair and grief are not uncommon and can wreak havoc on your self-esteem. It is these feelings that the group focuses on. The group is facilitated by a professional counselor, and currently consists of ten men.

MOP is also involved in producing informative community forums where men are invited to discuss issues that are important to them. The first forum featured the flamboyant Vancouver sex nun, Sister C, and was titled ManSex. 50 men participated in the serious, but humour

filled evening. A second forum is in the works, details to be issued at a later date.

The third component of MOP is the Latex

Brigade. The Latex Brigade is a volunteer peer based outreach team. This trained team will undertake outreach in bars, bathhouses, special events and public sex environments. Robb Stewart, the Gay Community Outreach Worker, believes that by respecting the culture and etiquette of these specific environments, the team will be well received.

Robb would like to see a solid and long standing commitment to the Men's Outreach Project, and with the federal government funding (ACAP)coming to an end in the spring of 1998, this project is in jeopardy. Robb would also like to see the AVI Education Department put the "gay" back in AIDS, and feels that while AIDS does affect everyone, it does not affect everyone equally. Gay men still comprise 73.5% of AIDS cases in Canada.

In parting, Robb stated that "We need to empower men to make healthy choices. We as educators don't always have the answers. Ultimately it's the decision of the men out there to do something with the information that we provide. We are excited to be working together with those men to find solutions to these issues."

BOOK REVIEW

Cocaine, AIDS, and Intravenous Drug Use

This compilation of articles starts with the premise that drug use cannot be controlled and that attempts to stop it will only drive it further underground and will hinder efforts to reach users and their partners via clean needles and safer sex messages. Its nors claim that drug prevention is too little and, in most cases, too late for a large number of longer-term users.

Financial Assistance Fund Report & Recommendations Adopted Feb. 11, 1997

From: The FAF Task Force To: The AVI Membership

On December 12, 1996 the Board of Directors suspended the Financial Assistance Fund as a result of over expenditures. The annual budget of \$50,000 had been spent by the beginning of the December. Following the suspension of the fund a process was put in place to problem-solve the lack of resources for this fund and the program in general.

Following this meeting the Board established a Task Force with a mandate to examine the issues and identify options connected with the FAF and to make recommendations for a renewed FAF.

The Task Force sought and obtained input from the PWA Caucus in mid-December. In early January the working group, whose membership consisted of individuals from a broad sector of the agency, community partners and people living with HIV/AIDS, met to identify strategies which would address the concerns presented through the Caucus. Subsequent to this meeting a Subcommittee was struck to develop recommendations for the Board of Directors to consider at its February meeting. The Subcommittee's membership consisted of: Ted Matthews, Wally Hiebert, Washington J., George Kirkpatrick, Karen Whyte, and Ruthann Tucker.

The following are the identified issues and recommendations from the Subcommittee of the FAF Task Force. These recommendations were adopted at the February 11, 1997 meeting of the Board of Directors.

Key staff and Board Committees will now work together to develop a comprehensive workplan to implement the recommendations.

Issue #1 The FAF creates dependency/expectation; need to clarify the focus, purpose, principles of the FAF.

Recommendations:

1.0 Replace the Financial Assistance Fund with a combination of support programming and an Emergency Assistance Fund

Timeline: EAF April 01, 1997

Programs May 01, 1997

2.0 To develop and define philosophical and operating principles for Support Services, including Nanaimo, within AVI. (To develop goals and objectives for support at AVI.)

Timeline: Goals & Objectives March 01, 1997

Polices & Procedures May 01, 1997

3.0 To clarify support and advocacy roles within AIDS Vancouver Island.

Cim e: March 31, 1997

4.0 To develop programs and services within Support Services, including Nanaimo, which support the goals and objectives and do not duplicate existing ones.

<u>Timeline:</u> May 01, 1997



Financial Assistance Fund Report and Recommendations (continued)

- 4.1 Develop a strong referral program which links clients to a range of programs and services and agencies that meet their individual set of needs. For example:
- Peer Support **Nutrition Counselling** Meals on Wheels Alcohol and Drug Counselling CRD Health Homecare Food Banks **BCPWA** VARCS Clothing **BCPWD** VPWAS **Emergency Shelter** Support Groups NIAC Housing Community Kitchens Hospice

Timeline: May 01, 1997

- 4.2 To develop an Emergency Assistance Fund with the following characteristics:
- Promote self-sufficiency;
- Maximizes AVI accountability;
- Minimizes administrative costs;
- Clear, consistent and known criteria;
- Fixed amount allocated per month for the fund based on AVI's ability to resource;
- Measure program effectiveness through evaluation at six (6) and twelve (12) months
- Maximum per request and per year;
- To look for alternatives to cash wherever possible (e.g. food vouchers);
- AVI staff will be required, when possible, to link the EAF request to a program or service which addresses the underlying issue (i.e. as in 4.1 Referral Program)

Timeline: April 01, 1997

Issue #2 Accountability

Recommendations:

1.0 To develop and define out-come based measurements for Support Services and Nanaimo support program.

Timeline: May 01, 1997

2.0 To develop a consistent and in-depth client intake/assessment system.

Timeline: May 01, 1997

3.0 To develop an effective and accurate Management Information Systems for monitoring and tracking AVI programs. To ensure that this system is simple and practical.

Timeline: June 01, 1997

Recommendations:

- 1.0 Clarify to members, clients, volunteers etc, funding structures within the non-profit sector. Timeline: Immediate and Ongoing
- 2.0 Clarify the funding structure for the Emergency Assistance Fund. (Where does the money for this fund come from.) <u>Timeline:</u> Immediate and Ongoing
- 3.0 To measure costs of administration with a view to reducing those costs throughout direct service areas. Timeline: June 01, 1997
- 4.0 Provide training opportunities in order to maximise the use of volunteers.

Timeline: April 01, 1997 ongoing

5.0 To enhance the role of HIV+ people as volunteers within AVI.

Timeline: April 01, 1997 and ongoing

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Well, the book does offer some insight into problems that are specific to cocaine and sunsts drug therapy to combat withdrawal synngtoms that are associated with it. It also talks about some of the reasons why conventional drug treatment programs such as methadone maintenance may be ineffective in dealing with cocaine and cross addictions.

The main thrust of the book however is that, like it or not, there will always be a sizable IV drug user population and that, gee folks, they do have sex! In 1990, 22% of all US AIDS cases were related to IV drug use; 52% of all heterosexual cases and 59% of pediatric cases could be traced to IV drug use.

The challenge for AIDS educators and clean needle advocates lies in finding ways to connect with this community by making IV drug users feel that health issues are important to them and their partners. The authors offer suggestions on how to empower and educate addicts and to engage them in the process and how to reach a rather forgotten group of those at for AIDS: women who have sex with IV drug users. Condom use is very low for this high risk segment of society, particularly where it concerns regular partners.

PWA Caucus meetings will be held quarterly.


